**RECOMMENDATIONS FOR REBALANCING THE
LONG TERM CARE SYSTEM**

**PROGRESS UPDATE
2012**

The Long Term Care Council has continued its work in analyzing the long term care service delivery system within Albany County, exploring more components of the service delivery system, involving additional community representatives with specific areas of expertise, and delving more in-depth into selected service areas, best practices and recommended strategies.

Once again, the Council has modified timeframes for specific strategies and action steps based on work activities as well as State and local funding constraints. The Council also continues to assess each action step to determine if they need to be revised, updated or if another action step needs to be added or substituted to align strategically in the short term, long term or both.

In 2009, the Council identified specific concerns related to the current service environment for individuals with disabilities under the age of 60. Several of these gaps are significant but the Council's jurisdiction may be limited. The Council will re-examine these gaps and identify whether the current action steps in the plan can be expanded/revised or if there are other achievable action steps that should be added to the plan to help address some of the existing gaps in service capacities for this population.

In 2010, the priority areas Long Term Care Council focused their efforts on were:

Care Coordination

Goal #2: Expand the availability of care coordination and case management services to assist the elderly and disabled, as well as their caregivers, in accessing services and resources that address their long term care needs.

A Care Coordination and Crisis Management Services which provided short-term, episodic and emergency assistance, to manage points of transition and prevent unnecessary hospitalizations or nursing home placements was implemented.

Aging and Disabled Friendly Communities

Goal #7 Strategy: Promote the adoption of policies and practices friendly to aging and disabled persons, including but not limited to universal accessible design.

With a Community Empowerment grant we were able to collaborate with Schenectady County and conduct forums to provide education on aging friendly communities as well as receive input from a variety of constituents about what the Counties should focus on as priorities to make their communities more accessible. A final report on the outcomes of the Community Empowerment forums will be available at the beginning of 2011.

Consumer-Directed Model for EISEP

Goal #4: Expand the availability of home care services to all persons in need in order to prevent their unnecessary hospitalization or nursing home placement.

Albany County was a participant in a NYSOFA-sponsored pilot program for deployment of a consumer-directed model for EISEP service provision under a Community Living Program Grant. With this grant we were able to offer consumer directed care under EISEP and also expanding the utilization of EISEP funding for ancillary type services.

In 2011 and 2012, the LTCC focused their efforts on:

- **With the receipt of an Aging and Disability Resource Center Grant the Council assisted Albany County Departments of Social Services and Aging to develop a Community Supports Navigator Volunteer Care Transitions Program. Additionally, NY Connects was enhanced through training and integration of an Options Counseling on long term care services component.**
- **The LTCC promoted and discussed the ongoing pilot of the Consumer Directed EISEP program and addition of ancillary type services as a permanent component of the EISEP program.**
- **Development of a Housing with Supportive Services Model**
- **Discussions and understanding of Medicaid Redesign Initiatives and its impact on the long term care system.**

The information presented in this Progress Update Report of Recommendations represents an evolving process of analysis and planning. The findings and recommendations provided are based upon the Council's broad review of what is an extremely complex service delivery system. Based on the ongoing discussions in relation to the many aspects of the long term care system, the Long Term Care Council is committed to making revisions and updates to this document in order to guide the development of long term care services in Albany County.

PROGRESS UPDATE 2012

With the continued uncertainty of the availability of funding resources, the issuance of a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a Consultant to work with the lead agencies and the LTCC in developing an inventory of available services, identifying gaps in resources, best practices, trends and related recommendations has been postponed indefinitely. The LTCC will continue to utilize their expertise and seek out alternative ways to identify the gaps, best practices and inventory of available services in order to make additional recommendations.

PROGRESS UPDATE 2012

LTCC discussions continue to focus on identifying resources, conducting gap analysis, as well as identifying and prioritizing unmet needs. The intent of the LTCC is to annually update the Report of Recommendations, continually building upon the analysis, goals, strategies and targeted action steps. The LTCC discussions are increasingly becoming more specific as we move forward.

PROGRESS UPDATE 2012
During 2010, with a Community Empowerment Grant, and support of elected officials we were able to hold joint forums with Schenectady and Albany County stakeholders to discuss shared concerns in relation to aging and disabled friendly communities as well as long term care resources. This was an initial approach to collaborative discussions. The LTCC should assess whether additional combined efforts focusing on long term care service resources can be realized over the next few years.

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In May 2010, Rehabilitative Support Services, Inc. was established as provider of record for the Care Coordination Program which provided short term assistance to manage points of transition and prevent unnecessary hospitalizations and nursing homes placements. The program ended in October 2011 due to County funding constraints. The Care Coordination Program assisted 88 individuals (less than anticipated); 57.3% were diverted from an institutional setting, 11.25% ended up in a higher level of care. Those who were diverted from a higher level of care provided an estimate of savings of approximately \$700,000 during the existence of the program.

PROGRESS UPDATE 2012

During 2012, the LTCC focused their efforts on developing a Housing with Supportive Services Model. The Housing with Supportive Services Sub Committee met several times throughout the year to flesh out the potential model. Once fully developed, DePaul Housing has agreed to pilot the model at a few of their low income senior housing complexes located in Albany County. We are currently working with Umbrella of the Capital District to determine the potential to utilize a modified version of this program as a component of this model for DePaul Housing residents as well as the traditional Umbrella program for those low income individuals residing in their own homes. We anticipate the potential model construct being finalized and piloted in 2013.

There were no new shared aide sites developed in 2012. Ongoing analysis of Albany County's personal care caseload and discussions with home care providers will continue for potential expansion and development of new shared aide sites.

PROGRESS UPDATE 2012

In 2010, discussions and assessment of the current Social Adult Day Services Program utilization, admission guidelines, discharge guidelines, hours of service, list of services provided in each of the Day Services Program, unmet needs and current funding streams was completed. A forum on Adult Day Care Programs and Capital District Adult Day Services Guide was developed based on these discussions. A more comprehensive assessment that also includes consumer/caregiver perspective should occur in relation to both medical and social adult day care programs, assessing utilization, funding issues and other unmet needs to expand Adult Day Service capacity. Consideration of collaborating with the NYS Adult Day Health Care Council to conduct an assessment should be considered. The NYSOFA Caregiver Support Assessment conducted in 2010 may be helpful with this process.

PROGRESS UPDATE 2012

Albany County is currently in the process of expanding specific components of support services such as shopping assistance programs for consumers and caregivers to utilize. Additionally we are working with NYSOFA and 2-1-1 to develop an online resource database for 24/7 access to services available for consumers and caregivers. Although there are currently no available funding sources to support the non-elderly disabled population in the purchase of home delivered meals, this population can access the HDM program through a private pay mechanism. The LTCC will continue to explore our ability and need to expand the availability of support services targeting caregivers and consumers.

The LTCC has delayed this strategy to focus on other priorities that have been identified by the members. The Council still agrees an evaluation and discussion of Senior Services of Albany's federally funded Telephone Support Group should be conducted. The analysis should include whether support groups are being utilized and desired by caregivers, what percentage of SSA's support group participation are of individuals from rural areas of Albany County, and what is the efficacy of telephone support groups in providing necessary caregiver support. If the analysis suggests there is a need to expand the existing support group or establish additional telephone support groups, the LTCC will explore and pursue opportunities for funding to be secured through federal or private grant funds.

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The Council should continue to monitor the progress and strategic focus of the different divisions of the NYSDOH which is charged with developing the Health Insurance Exchange and coordinating health IT programs and policies across the public and private health care sectors. The Council should determine the impact this shift in technology will have in the way long term care services (both medical and non-medical) will be provided, as well as how benefits are accessed.

As previously reported, as Medicaid and Food Stamps continue to reduce the requirements of consumers to have face-to-face interviews, Albany County Dept. of Social Services need to establish videoconferencing has been reduced. The Council should continue to monitor and explore how to further expand and utilize this technology to facilitate consumer benefit applications.

PROGRESS UPDATE 2012

Education of key providers regarding available community-based services, and encouraging earlier referrals and enhanced cross-system communications is an ongoing process and is continuously part of the LTCC discussions on how to streamline access to long term care services. Additional work should be done to develop MOU's with hospital and rehabilitation facilities, medical practices, etc.

In relation to educating employers and employees, although NY Connects offers education and outreach to all employers and organizations throughout Albany County, and we have been successful in reaching some employees at Aetna Insurance Company and in working with some EAP representatives for a few local employers, the LTCC should re-evaluate the action steps affiliated with this goal to determine what key resources are needed to assist employees in preparing for potential long term care needs for themselves or a family member as well as how to best distribute this information.

PROGRESS UPDATE 2012

Albany County, in partnership with Schenectady County, received a NYS Office for Aging Community Empowerment Planning Grant to promote livable communities that are “friendly” toward aging and disabled populations. Throughout 2010, multiple forums were held with specific municipalities, businesses, organizations, individuals, and other stakeholders. These forums led to dialogue where community needs were identified and suggested plans of action toward implementing changes could be developed. A final report on these planning forums was released in 2011. The LTCC should determine whether additional dialogue should be occurring with public sector leaders and planning officials regarding aging and disabled friendly communities.

PROGRESS UPDATE 2012

The LTCC continues to work on identifying the funding and regulatory changes impacting the long term care system on a program specific level rather than having the LTCC develop an entire policy advocacy agenda. Those funding and regulatory barriers identified will be reported within the priorities and initiatives addressed and undertaken so they can be shared at local and state levels.
